#### Supporting Wilson County's Annual Emergency Management Tabletop Exercise



The exercise utilized the SimTable to model flooding scenarios across the county, allowing participants to visualize potential impacts and evaluate response strategies in real time. This interactive approach enhanced situational awareness and supported informed decision-making throughout the exercise.

#### Bridging Public Infrastructure with State Security

How proactive infrastructure maintenance enables more effective commerce, emergency management, and security mitigation.

The resilience of Texas' transportation infrastructure, especially bridges, is vital to public safety, economic stability, and statewide mobility. Though often overlooked when well maintained, underfunded or neglected bridges can create serious safety hazards, disrupt supply chains, and trigger significant economic losses. This paper evaluates the condition of Texas bridges, focusing



on structural integrity, maintenance status, and potential vulnerabilities, including the economic impact of disruptions to heavily traveled corridors. Drawing on state and federal data along with ASCE and ARTBA assessments, it highlights the state's most traveled bridges, compares Texas' performance to national averages, and examines risks ranging from structural failure to cyber or terrorist interference. The analysis outlines the safety, economic, and operational consequences of deficient bridges and concludes by recommending stronger maintenance investment, real-time monitoring, and cross-sector coordination to enhance the resilience and security of Texas' transportation network.

Michael Aspland has 36 years of public service that includes a background in criminal justice, homeland security, and public service. He was the first member of the IHS team, bringing together a group of professionals from the public and private sectors to set the Institute on a path to improving critical infrastructure protection for Texas. The journey to the Lone Star State began in 2014 when he retired from law enforcement after 26 years of service in California and started a second career in academics at the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA.
